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• WHO IT'S FOR

For people who no longer need to *get by* in Spanish, and are ready to actually *think in it* — to hold an opinion, tell a longer story, or follow an argument.

For students who've completed A1-A2 (or the equivalent) and want to keep going. No fixed content — this level is shaped around each student.

• HOW THIS LEVEL WORKS

A1-A2 is a fixed curriculum — the same for everyone, built to get you moving. B1-B2 is different by design: the grammar still progresses in a clear, deliberate order, but the topics are chosen with each student rather than set in advance.

In practice that means using real subjects from Latin America as material for conversation — never as a checklist to cover. Examples: the archaeology of San Agustín, Inca history, how mate is prepared and shared differently from country to country, regional food and nature, or a current political or economic debate.

These are starting points, not a syllabus to memorize — the goal is always the language: narrating, comparing, arguing, qualifying, reacting.

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Starting to narrate and argue

The shift from managing immediate situations to narrating experiences, relating events, and giving opinions.

B1 From getting by to explaining yourself

The point where you stop just describing the present and start narrating, comparing, and giving reasons.

YOU'LL BE ABLE TO

Narrate a past experience with some detail; place events in relation to one another; describe how something used to be versus what happened; compare places or customs; explain reasons and consequences; express and justify an opinion; give advice; react emotionally; talk about plans and possibilities; make wishes; handle a conversation that goes off script.

Building an argument

Nuance appears: not just stating an opinion, but building a position, hypothesizing, qualifying it, and contrasting it with another.

B2 From opinion to argument

The level where Spanish becomes a tool for real discussion — holding a position, not just stating one.

YOU'LL BE ABLE TO

Sustain and develop an argument; agree or disagree without being elementary about it; form hypotheses; speculate about causes; talk about hypothetical or counterfactual situations; qualify statements; compare perspectives; tell fairly complex stories; report what someone else said; explain possible or imagined consequences; respond to other people's arguments; rephrase when something isn't understood; take part in extended conversations with real spontaneity.
